



Delivering Better Care, Better Health, and Lower Costs in Suffolk County

Background

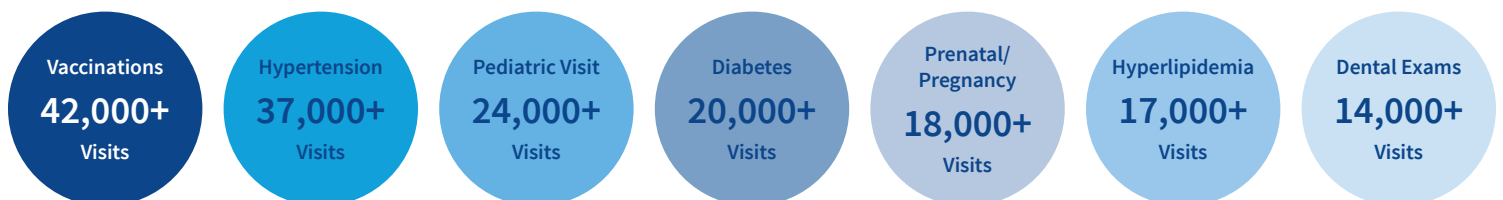
In 2012, at the request of the New York State (NYS) Department of Health and local county officials, Hudson River Health Care (HRHCare) began to transition eight county-run primary care centers into HRHCare Health Centers. The county clinics faced severe budget cuts and impending closures, which would have left 53,000 patients without a source of care and 500 employees at these sites without jobs. Instead, HRHCare assumed leadership of these health centers, refurbished and modernized the facilities, and optimized operations consistent with Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) productivity standards. In the transition of one center alone, Suffolk county saved \$4.9 million in staffing costs, added dental and mental health care, increased federal and state aid, and gave the community access to federal programs, such as those that provide free vaccines to children.



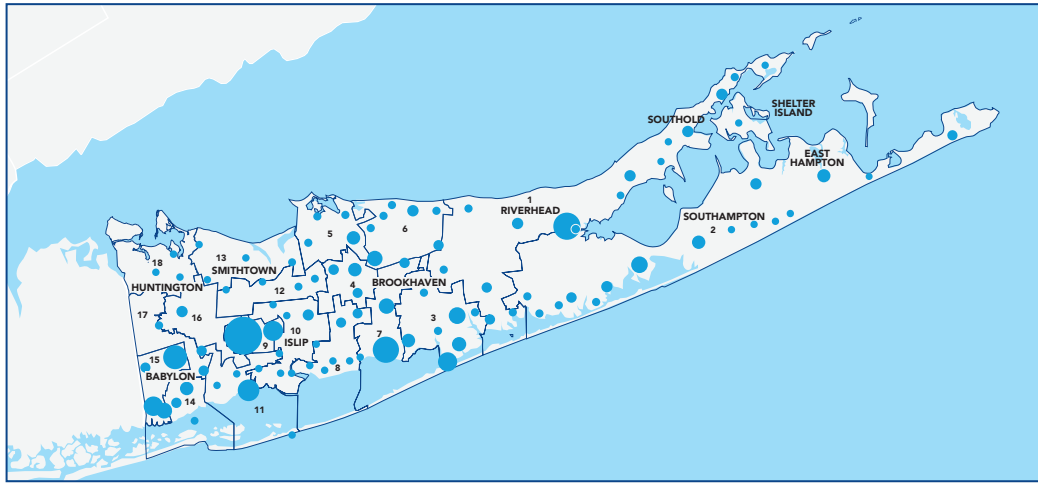
Highlights

- Hudson River Health Care’s work in Suffolk county has helped ensure greater financial stability, in addition to enhanced, coordinated health care for residents. According to a 2009 report, the deficit associated with operating the county health centers was projected to grow 66% over 5 years, from \$22.5 million in 2005, to over \$37 million by 2010. Had the growth continued on the same trajectory, the deficit would have surpassed \$50 million by 2018
- Through this coordinated network, HRHCare serves 68,000 patients through 250,000 annual visits, with 330 full-time staff. Before the transition in 2012, the system served 53,00 patients, representing a 30% growth (15,00 patients) over the past 5 years
- HRHCare operates these sites as a unified network, with a single Electronic Medical Record (EMR) system, improved access through efficient staffing models, and extended weekday and weekend service hours
- HRHCare introduced dental services into the system, and now provides over 10,000 visits for exams, cleanings, and other services annually
- HRHCare has leveraged partnerships with state, federal, and foundation stakeholders to provide free medical and dental services for agricultural workers and veterans
- HRHCare has implemented a 127-student medical and dental residency program spanning the county, encouraging recently-graduated medical students to serve their local communities
- HRHCare Health Home, the largest in NYS, provides vital care management services to over 10,000 Long Island patients, and has successfully decreased hospital emergency department utilization by 26% in just two years
- HRHCare has introduced strategies to address the opioid crisis in Suffolk County, which has suffered from the highest rate of opioid deaths in NYS, such as responsible clinical practice guidelines for prescriptions and Naloxone (Narcan) training to equip communities with the appropriate skills to act in case of an overdose emergency
- HRHCare continues to invest in improving efficiencies through value based care, and serves in a leadership capacity within the Suffolk Care Collaborative as a part of the Delivery System Reform Incentive Payment (DSRIP) Program
